Privacy Notices 2026



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1. Introduction

Under UK data protection law, individuals have a right to be informed about how our school uses any personal data that we hold about them. We comply with this right by providing ‘privacy notices’ (sometimes called ‘fair processing notices’) to individuals where we are processing their personal data.

This privacy notice explains how we collect, store and use personal data about **pupils at our school**.

This privacy notice applies while we believe your child is not capable of understanding and exercising their own data protection rights.

Once your child is able to understand their rights over their own personal data (generally considered to be age 12, but this has to be considered on a case-by-case basis), you should instead refer to our privacy notice for pupils to see what rights they have over their own personal data.

We, Charlesworth VC Primary School, are the ‘data controller’ for the purposes of UK data protection law.

2. The personal data we hold

We hold personal data about pupils at our school to support teaching and learning, to provide pastoral care and to assess how the school is performing.

Personal data that we may collect, use, store and share (when appropriate) about your child includes, but is not restricted to:

- Contact details, contact preferences, date of birth, identification documents
- Results of internal assessments and externally set tests
- Pupil and curricular records
- Exclusion information
- Attendance information
- Safeguarding information
- Details of any support received, including care packages, plans and support providers
- Information about your child’s use of our information and communications systems, equipment and facilities (e.g. school computers)

We may also collect, use, store and share (when appropriate) information about your child that falls into 'special categories' of more sensitive personal data. This includes, but is not restricted to:

- Information about any medical conditions we need to be aware of, including physical and mental health
- Photographs and CCTV images captured in school
- Information about characteristics, such as ethnic background or special educational needs (SEN)

We may also hold data about your child that we have received from other organisations, including other schools and local authorities.

3. Why we use this data

We collect and use the data listed above to:

- a) Support pupil learning
- b) Monitor and report on pupil progress
- c) Provide appropriate pastoral care
- d) Protect pupil welfare
- e) Assess the quality of our services
- f) Administer admissions waiting lists
- g) Carry out research
- h) Administer school property
- i) Comply with the law regarding data sharing
- j) Make sure our information and communication systems, equipment and facilities (e.g. school computers) are used appropriately, legally and safely

We will only use your child's personal information for the purposes for which we have collected it, unless we reasonably consider that we need to use it for any other reason and that reason is incompatible with the original purpose. If we need to use your child's personal information for an unrelated purpose, we will notify you and explain the legal basis that allows us to do so.

Please note that we may process your child's personal information without your knowledge or consent in compliance with the above rules where this is required or permitted by law.

3.1 Use of your child's personal data for marketing purposes

Where you have given us consent to do so, we may send your child marketing information by email or text promoting school events, campaigns, charitable causes or services that may be of interest to them.

You can withdraw consent or 'opt out' of receiving these emails and/or texts at any time by selecting the 'Unsubscribe' link at the bottom of any such communication, or by contacting us (see 'Contact us' below).

3.2 Use of your child's personal data in automated decision-making and profiling

We do not currently process any pupils' personal data through automated decision-making or profiling. If this changes in the future, we will amend any relevant privacy notices to explain the processing to you, including your right to object to it.

3.3 Use of your child's personal data for filtering and monitoring purposes

While your child is in our school, we may monitor their use of our information and communication systems, equipment and facilities (e.g. school computers). We do this so we can:

- Comply with health and safety, and other legal obligations
- Comply with our policies (e.g. child protection policy, IT acceptable use policy) and our legal obligations
- Keep our network(s) and devices safe from unauthorised access, and prevent malicious software from harming our network(s)
- Protect your child's welfare

4. Our lawful basis for using this data

Our lawful bases for processing your child's personal data for the purposes listed in section 3 above are as follows:

- For the purposes of those reasons listed in section 3, in accordance with the 'public task' basis – we need to process data to fulfil our statutory function as a school.
- For the purposes of those reasons listed in section 3, in accordance with the 'legal obligation' basis – we need to process data to meet our responsibilities under law.
- For the purposes of those reasons listed in section 3, in accordance with the 'consent' basis – we will obtain consent from you to use your child's personal data
- For the purposes of those reasons listed in section 3, in accordance with the 'vital interests' basis – we will use this personal data in a life-or-death situation
- For the purposes of those reasons listed in section 3, in accordance with the 'contract' basis – we need to process personal data to fulfil a contract with your child or to help them enter into a contract with us
- For the purposes of those reasons listed in section 3, in accordance with the 'legitimate interests' basis – where there's a minimal privacy impact and we have a compelling reason.

Where you have provided us with consent to use your child's data, you may withdraw this consent at any time. We will make this clear when requesting your consent, and explain how you would go about withdrawing consent if you wish to do so.

4.1 Our basis for using special category data

For 'special category' data, we only collect and use it when we have both a lawful basis, as set out above, and 1 of the following conditions for processing as set out in UK data protection law:

- We have obtained your explicit consent to use your child's personal data in a certain way
- We need to perform or exercise an obligation or right in relation to employment, social security or social protection law
- We need to protect an individual's vital interests (i.e. protect your child's life or someone else's life), in situations where you're physically or legally incapable of giving consent
- The data concerned has already been made manifestly public by you
- We need to process it for the establishment, exercise or defence of legal claims
- We need to process it for reasons of substantial public interest as defined in legislation
- We need to process it for health or social care purposes, and the processing is done by, or under the direction of, a health or social work professional, or by any other person obliged to confidentiality under law
- We need to process it for public health reasons, and the processing is done by, or under the direction of, a health professional or by any other person obliged to confidentiality under law
- We need to process it for archiving purposes, scientific or historical research purposes, or for statistical purposes, and the processing is in the public interest

For criminal offence data, we will only collect and use it when we have both a lawful basis, as set out above, and a condition for processing as set out in UK data protection law. Conditions include:

- We have obtained your consent to use it in a specific way
- We need to protect an individual's vital interests (i.e. protect your child's life or someone else's life), in situations where you're physically or legally incapable of giving consent
- The data concerned has already been made manifestly public by you
- We need to process it for, or in connection with, legal proceedings, to obtain legal advice, or for the establishment, exercise or defence of legal rights
- We need to process it for reasons of substantial public interest as defined in legislation

5. Collecting this data

We will only collect and use your child's information when the law allows us to as detailed above in section 4 of this notice. While the majority of information we collect about your child is mandatory, there is some information that can be provided voluntarily.

Whenever we seek to collect information from you, we make it clear whether you must provide this information (and if so, what the possible consequences are of not complying), or whether you have a choice.

Most of the data we hold about your child will come from you, but we may also hold data about your child from:

- Local authorities
- Government departments or agencies
- Police forces, courts or tribunals
- Other schools or trusts
- Department for Education

6. How we store this data

We keep personal information about your child while they are attending our school. We may also keep it beyond their attendance at our school if this is necessary to comply with our legal obligations or to meet our regulatory requirements. Our Records Retention Policy sets out how long we keep information about pupils.

You can find our 'Records Retention Policy' on the school website or by contacting the office.

We have put in place appropriate security measures to prevent your child's personal information from being accidentally lost, used or accessed in an unauthorised way, altered or disclosed.

We will dispose of your child's personal data securely when we no longer have a legal requirement to retain it.

7. Who we share data with

We do not share information about your child with any third party without consent unless the law and our policies allow us to do so.

Where it is legally required or necessary (and it complies with UK data protection law), we may share personal information about your child with:

- Schools that your child may attend after leaving us – to transfer their education records and key details.
- Our local authority, Derbyshire County Council – to meet our legal obligations to share certain information with it, such as safeguarding concerns and information about exclusions
- Government departments or agencies – for safeguarding or SEND reasons.
- Youth support services provider
- Department for Education
- Our regulator – OFSTED or SIAMS
- Suppliers and service providers, including catering, filtering and monitoring
- Financial organisations
- Our auditors
- Survey and research organisations
- Health authorities
- Security organisations
- Health and social welfare organisations
- Professional advisers and consultants
- Charities and voluntary organisations
- Police forces, courts, tribunals

7.1 Sharing data with the Department for Education (DfE)

The Department for Education (a government department) collects personal data from schools and local authorities via various statutory data collections. We are required to share information about our pupils with the DfE either directly or via our local authority, via various statutory data collections.

The data shared will be in line with the following relevant legislation:

Section 3 of The Education (Information About Individual Pupils) (England) Regulations 2013

The data is transferred securely and held by the Department for Education under a combination of software and hardware controls that meet the current government security policy framework.

The data we share with the DfE is used for a number of purposes, including to:

- Inform funding
- Monitor education policy and school accountability
- Support research

The information shared with the DfE could include:

- Your child's name and address
- Unique pupil numbers
- Pupil matching reference numbers
- Gender or ethnicity
- Details of any special educational needs (SEN)
- Details of schools attended
- Absence and exclusion information
- Information relating to exam results
- Information relating to any contact with children's services
- What they did after they finished school

Please note: this list is not exhaustive.

National Pupil Database (NPD)

We are required to provide information about pupils to the DfE as part of statutory data collections such as the school census

Some of this information is then stored in the [National Pupil Database](#) (NPD), which is owned and managed by the DfE and provides evidence on school performance to inform research.

The database is held electronically so it can easily be turned into statistics. The information is securely collected from a range of sources including schools, local authorities and exam boards.

The DfE may share information from the NPD with third parties, such as other organisations that promote children's education or wellbeing in England. These third parties must agree to strict terms and conditions about how they will use the data.

8. Your rights

8.1 How to access personal information that we hold about your child

You have a right to make a 'subject access request' to gain access to personal information that we hold about your child.

If you make a subject access request, and if we do hold information about your child, we will (subject to any exemptions that apply):

- Give you a description of it
- Tell you why we are holding it, how we are processing it, and how long we will keep it for
- Explain where we got it from, if not from you
- Tell you who it has been, or will be, shared with
- Let you know whether any automated decision-making is being applied to the data, and any consequences of this
- Give you a copy of the information in an intelligible form

You may also have the right for your child's personal information to be transmitted electronically to another organisation in certain circumstances.

8.2 Your right to access your child's educational record

Parents, or those with parental responsibility, also have the right to access their child's educational record (which includes most information about a pupil). This right applies as long as the pupil is aged under 18.

There are certain circumstances in which this right can be denied, such as if releasing the information might cause serious harm to the physical or mental health of the pupil or another individual, or if it would mean releasing exam marks before they are officially announced.

8.3 Your other rights regarding your child's data

Under UK data protection law, you have certain rights regarding how your child's personal data is used and kept safe. For example, you have the right to:

- Object to our use of your child's personal data
- Object to the processing of your child's personal data that is likely to cause, or is causing, damage or distress
- Prevent your child's data being used to send direct marketing
- Object to and challenge the use of your child's personal data for decisions being taken by automated means (by a computer or machine, rather than by a person)
- In certain circumstances, have inaccurate personal data corrected or blocked
- In certain circumstances, have the personal data we hold about your child deleted or destroyed, or restrict its processing
- Withdraw your consent, where you previously provided it for the collection, processing and transfer of your child's personal data for a specific purpose
- In certain circumstances, be notified of a data breach
- Make a complaint to the Information Commissioner's Office
- Claim compensation for damages caused by a breach of the data protection regulations

We may refuse your information rights request for legitimate reasons, which depend on why we're processing it. Some rights may not apply in these circumstances:

- Your right to have all personal data deleted or destroyed doesn't apply when the lawful basis for processing is legal obligation or public task
- Your right to receive a copy of your personal data, or have your personal data transmitted to another controller, does not apply when the lawful basis for processing is legal obligation, vital interests, public task or legitimate interests
- Right to object to use of your private data doesn't apply when the lawful basis for processing is contract, legal obligation or vital interests. And if the lawful basis is consent, you don't have the right to object, but you have the right to withdraw consent

Privacy notice for parents and carers – use of your personal data

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1. Introduction

Under UK data protection law, individuals have a right to be informed about how our school uses any personal data that we hold about them. This privacy notice explains how we collect, store and use personal data about **parents and carers of pupils at our school**.

We, Charlesworth VC Primary School, are the 'data controller' for the purposes of UK data protection law.

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Privacy notice for pupils

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This Privacy notice is written in more child-friendly language, so it should be easier for pupils to understand. It's for pupils you consider capable of understanding and exercising their rights over their own data (generally considered to be age 12, but you'll need to consider this on a case-by-case basis). Use the privacy notice for parents – use of your child's personal data, either alongside or instead of this notice, if you have children in your school that you don't consider capable of this.

1. Introduction

You have a legal right to be informed about how our school uses any personal information that we hold about you. To comply with this, we provide a 'privacy notice' to you where we are processing your personal data.

This Privacy notice explains how we collect, store and use personal data about pupils at our school, like you.

We, Charlesworth VC Primary School, are the 'data controller' for the purposes of UK data protection law.

2. The personal data we hold

We hold some personal information (data) about you to make sure we can help you learn and look after you at school.

For the same reasons, we get information about you from some other places too – such as other schools, the local council and the government.

Personal information that we may collect, use, store and share (when appropriate) about you includes, but is not restricted to:

- Your contact details
- Your test results, details about your learning and what you have achieved at school
- Your attendance records
- Details of any behaviour issues or exclusions
- Information about how you use school computers and other IT and communications systems

We may also collect, use, store and share (when appropriate) information about you that falls into 'special categories' of more sensitive personal data. This includes, but is not restricted to:

- Information about your characteristics, such as your ethnic background or any special educational needs (SEN)
- Information about any medical conditions you have
- Photographs and CCTV images

We may also hold data about you that we have received from other organisations, including other schools and local authorities.

3. Why we use this data

We use the data listed above to:

- a) Get in touch with you and your parents or carers when we need to
- b) Check how you're doing in exams and work out whether you or your teachers need any extra help
- c) Track how well the school as a whole is performing
- d) Look after your wellbeing and keep you safe
- e) Make sure our computers and other school systems and equipment are used appropriately, legally and safely
- f) Answer your questions and complaints
- g) Publish statistics, for example, about the number of pupils or learners in schools
- h) Meet legal requirements placed upon us

Most of the data we hold about you will come from you, but we may also hold data about you from:

- Police forces, courts or tribunals

6. How we store this data

We keep personal information about you while you volunteer at our school. We may also keep it beyond your work at our school if this is necessary. Our Records Retention Policy sets out how long we keep information about governors and other volunteers.

We have put in place appropriate security measures to prevent your personal information from being accidentally lost, used or accessed in an unauthorised way, altered or disclosed.

We will dispose of your personal data securely when we no longer need it.

7. Who we share data with

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1. Introduction

Under UK data protection law, individuals have a right to be informed about how our school uses any personal data that we hold about them. We comply with this right by providing 'privacy notices' (sometimes called 'fair processing notices') to individuals where we are processing their personal data.

This privacy notice explains how we collect, store and use personal data about **visitors to the school**.

We, Charlesworth VC Primary School, are the 'data controller' for the purposes of UK data protection law.

2. The personal data we hold

Personal data that we may collect, use, store and share (when appropriate) about you includes, but is not restricted to:

- Name
- Contact details
- Information relating to the visit, e.g. company or organisation name, arrival and departure time, and vehicle number plate
- Information about your use of our information and communication systems, equipment and facilities (e.g. school computers)

We may also collect, use, store and share (when appropriate) information about you that falls into 'special categories' of more sensitive personal data. This includes, but is not restricted to:

- Information about any access arrangements that may be required
- Photographs for identification purposes
- CCTV images captured in school

We may also hold data about you that we have received from other organisations, including other schools and local authorities.

3. Why we use this data

We collect and use the data listed above to:

- a) Identify you and keep you safe while on the school site
- b) Keep pupils and staff safe

- c) Maintain accurate records of visits to the school
- d) Provide appropriate access arrangements
- e) Make sure our information and communication systems, equipment and facilities (e.g. school computers) are used appropriately, legally and safely
- f) Meet legal requirements placed upon us

We will only use your personal information for the purposes for which we have collected it, unless we reasonably consider that we need to use it for any other reason and that reason is compatible with the original purpose. If we need to use your personal information for an unrelated purpose, we will notify you and explain the legal basis which allows us to do so.

Please note that we may process your personal information without your knowledge or consent in compliance with the above rules where this is required or permitted by law

3.1 Use of your personal data for marketing purposes

Where you have given us consent to do so, we may send you marketing information by email or text promoting school events, campaigns, charitable causes or services that may be of interest to you.

You can withdraw consent or 'opt out' of receiving these emails and/or texts at any time by selecting the 'Unsubscribe' link at the bottom of any such communication, or by contacting us (see 'Contact us' below).

3.2 Use of your personal data in automated decision-making and profiling

We do not currently process any visitors' personal data through automated decision-making or profiling. If this changes in the future, we will amend any relevant privacy notices in order to explain the processing to you, including your right to object to it.

3.3 Use of your personal data for filtering and monitoring purposes

While you're in our school, we may monitor your use of our information and communication systems, equipment and facilities (e.g. school computers). We do this so that we can:
